WHERE STUDYING IS AN ACT OF

Study is the adventure of learning that Truth that everything points to: this was the discovery of a group of college students in the United States

"Father, yesterday evening you told us that knowledge and love ultimately coincide. What does this mean? I don't like English literature, and yet I need to study it to pass my exams."

his question posed by Tommy is a litmus test for the claim of the Christian companionship to be able to sustain the life of the students in a university campus and to change it from within, that is, in the reason for which one studies and in the way he studies. And within this question of Tommy lies the reason why twenty students decided to spend the weekend before exams in a cottage in the forests of Virginia.

Here at Catholic University in Washington, D.C., the last week of the semester is dedicated to final exams. The short amount of time available between the end of lessons and the beginning of exams (just a weekend!) makes it such that most of the students spend the last hours of the semester memorizing notions, instead of seeking to understand how the texts examined in their classes might contribute to engaging and going deeper into the fundamental question of the course. There is no time to stay in front of the question when there is only time to assimilate the right answer that allows you to pass the quiz.

With this overwhelming preoccupation, study becomes organized in an essentially quantitative way so that a student can read or write the greatest number of pages in the shortest time possible. [...] Not even prayer and friendship are spared this subtle veil of utilitarianism: prayers are for passing grades on the tests and studying together helps one stay on the books for more than just two hours at a time. In the long term, this measure becomes suffocating. The only alternative is to ask oneself what it means to study, if the nature of such a judgment is only quantitative or else above all qualitative.

A Christian companionship that is true inevitably finds itself challenging every efficiency-based criterion. Indeed, Christian companionship testifies that the knowledge of truth is a communal experience capable of giving unity to life. Christian companionship shows that only love moves one towards knowledge of the other and that the more one knows the other the more one loves him or her. Christian companionship generates an integrated person in whom the affective dimension is not sentimentally reduced to what one likes or dislikes and the intellectual dimension is not reduced to how much information one knows or does not know. The desire to know the truth of self and the world orders all aspects of the individual person. The same desire creates communion among different people. Christian companionship is the place where truth is revealed in its

origin and end: the divine Word making itself present in Jesus Christ.

Studying is the adventure of knowing that Truth of which everything else is a sign.

Studying then is not so much a question of assimilating and repeating a set of notions, as much as knowing the love that gives form to reality and defines the truth of everything. For this reason, the twenty-odd students that decided to drive together to Williamsburg, to cook pasta, to sit at the table and share about their lives, to take care of the beauty of the place, to pray in the morning and in the evening, to sing around the fire did so not because they simply desire to study but rather because they desire to study well. Because studying becomes the adventure of knowing that Truth of which everything else is a sign, because studying is part of the drama of responding to that Love that calls all of us to know Him and to stay with Him. At the end of the weekend, Tommy returned home proud to have studied much and well. "It's a miracle," his mother immediately exclaimed. It is the miracle of a companionship in which the Truth is a person and knowledge is that relationship from which no one can escape, because it is what makes us truly human.










ABIDE IN ME

POPE FRANCIS | REGINA CAELI Sunday, May 9, 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

n this Sunday's Gospel passage (Jn 15:9-17) after having compared himself to the vine and us to the branches, Jesus, explains what *fruit* is borne by those who remain united to him: this fruit is *love*. He again repeats the key-verb: abide. He invites us to abide in his love so that his joy may be in us and our joy may be full (vv. 9-11). To abide in Jesus' love.

Let us ask ourselves: what is this love in which Jesus tells us to abide to have his joy? What is this love? It is the love that originates in the Father, because "God is love" (1 In 4:8). This love of God, of the Father, flows like a river in his Son Jesus and through him comes to us, his creatures. Indeed, he says: "As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you" (In 15:9). The love Jesus gives us is the same with which the Father loves him: pure unconditional love, freely given love. It cannot be bought, it is free. By giving it to us, Jesus treats us like friends-with this love-letting us know the Father; and he involves us in his same mission for the life of the world.

And then, we can ask ourselves the question, how do we abide in this love? Jesus says: "If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love" (v. 10). Jesus summarized his commandments in a single one, this: "that you love one another as I have loved you" (v. 12). To love *as* Jesus Christ means to offer yourself in service, at the service of your brothers and sisters, as he did in washing the feet of the disciples. It also means going outside of ourselves, detaching ourselves from our own human certainties, from earthly comforts, in order to open ourselves up to others, especially those in greater need. It means making ourselves available, as we are and with what we have. This means to love not in word but in deeds.

To love like Christ means saying 'no' to other 'loves' that the world offers us: love of money-those who love money do not love as Jesus loves-love of success, of vanity, of power... These deceptive paths of "love" distance us from the Lord's love and lead us to become more and more selfish, narcissistic and overbearing. And being overbearing leads to a degeneration of love, to the abuse of others, to making our loved ones suffer. I am thinking of the unhealthy love that turns into violence-and how many women are victims of violence these days. This is not love. To love as the Lord loves us means to appreciate the people beside us, to respect their freedom, to love them as they are, not as we want them to be; as they are, gratuitously. Ultimately, Jesus asks us to abide in his love, to dwell in his love, not in our ideas, not in our own self-worship. Those who dwell in selfworship live in the mirror: always looking at themselves. He asks us to overcome the ambition to control and manage others. Not controlling, serving them. Opening our heart to others, this is love, to be trusting, giving ourselves to others.

Dear brothers and sisters, where does this abiding in the Lord's love lead? Where does it lead us? Jesus told us: "That my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full" (v. 11). And the Lord wants that the joy he possesses, because he is in complete communion with the Father, also be in us insofar as we are united to him. The joy of knowing we are loved by God despite our infidelities enables us to face the trials of life confidently, makes us live through crises so as to emerge from them better. Our being true witnesses consists in living this joy, because joy is the distinctive sign of a true Christian. True Christians are not sad; they always have that joy inside, even in difficult moments.

May the Virgin Mary help us to *abide in Jesus' love* and to grow in love for everyone, witnessing to the joy of the Risen Lord.

Nativity is under the pastoral care of the **Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo**, a religious order, founded in 1985 by Msgr. Massimo Camisasca in Italy. The order has its origins in the charism of Fr. Luigi Giussani, founder of the Catholic lay movement Communion and Liberation (CL). Here is how the Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo is described by the founder, Msgr. Massimo Camisasca:

Fraternity: "The Fraternity is a companionship made up of people that are placed together by an Other. [...] Each of us [...] is continually accompanied by Christ through his brothers."

Priestly: "The priestly vocation [...] is a continuous communion with God and man. [...] It acts as a bridge between heaven and earth, represents a fundamental link in the history of salvation, and also serves as an important figure in the journey towards unity among men."

Missionary: "Mission [...] consists simply in entering within the same mission for which God sent His own Son into the world, for which the Son sent the Apostles, and for which, in turn, the Apostles sent other brothers, until the visible echo of that event touched even us."

The priests of the Fraternity live together in houses of three or more. The communion among them is meant to sustain their vocation and be a path towards conversion. They are willing to be sent around the world wherever the Church has a need, according to the wishes of the bishop of the diocese in which they reside. Learn more at:
